Symposia

Symposia are 1h30 scientific sessions on any issue related to NanolImpactNet, proposed and chaired by community members. These can consist of presentations and interactive components. Symposia give researchers a chance to present issues that are not addressed by this year's focus topics. The scientific committee will choose among the proposed topics.

Training school: Handling protocols and toxicological testing strategies

This training school will address higher level issues of best practice for safe handling of nanomaterials via appropriate protocols. Aimed at students and post-doctoral researchers working with nanomaterials, it will guarantee that their toxicological testing strategies meet up to international best practice.

Discussion groups

Discussion groups are 1h30 sessions for debating issues closely related to NanolImpactNet's work. Members of NanolImpactNet and the nanomedical community are invited to propose topics and to chair their topic-discussion. A discussion group can start with a presentation, but a maximum of time should be dedicated to discussions. Organisers are requested to produce an output that can be published.

Networking / Brokerage events

Rooms will be available for networking and brokerage activities related to European research, notably for the NanoSafetyCluster. Preference will be given to meetings of NanoSafetyCluster partners and to brokerage events that either address an upcoming European call or that seek to link European researchers to international partners.
